About the ICGI Workshop

INTERNATIONAL COTTON GENOME INITIATIVE (ICGI) was founded by a small group of researchers on cotton at Canberra, Australia during the year 2000. ICGI initiated with the major purpose of increasing the knowledge of structure and function of the cotton genome for the benefit of global community (http://icgi.tamu.edu). Aims are to facilitate global communications, collaboration and education, increase knowledge, and resource integration, enhance technology and resource development and help coordinate research planning in the areas of cotton genomics. Meetings were held in Canberra, 2000 (Australia) and Montpellier, 2001 (France).

The last meeting was the first Scientific ICGI Workshop and was held in Nanjing, China hosted by Nanjing Agricultural University. It was attended by more than 90 researchers from 14 countries and contributed 105 oral and poster presentations. The proceedings were published and are available on website of ICGI http://icgi.tamu.edu

The ICGI made announcement in the World Cotton Research Conference – 2003 held in South Africa about holding of 4th ICGI Workshop in India in 2004. ICGI functions through formalized structure and an International Steering Committee. Dr. David Stelly is the Chair of ICGI presently. There are new chairs and co-chairs for the 5 work groups that comprise ICGI's main organizational architecture. The five working groups are Structural Genomics, Functional Genomics, Germplasm and Genetic Stocks, Evolutionary and Comparative Genomics and Bioinformatics.

Each of these work groups are charged with executing the ICGI mission by:

- 1. Formulating long-term collaborations;
- 2. Identifying the strategic research goals;
- 3. Identifying shared resources;
- 4. Reporting activities and results to the ICGI community;




Hotels at Hyderabad

About the ICGI-2004 Workshop Venue-Hyderabad
